Originating in ancient China, Dragon Boat Racing is now the fastest growing water sport in the world and a favourite among charities for fundraising opportunities. Kingston Rotary has held this event every year since 2000 except during lockdown. Originally encouraged by a Rotarian who had witnessed a similar race in Abingdon, Oxfordshire.

This major community event is organised in conjunction with Dragon Boat Events, the leading dragon boat event organiser in the UK and is a fun-filled water sports activity. Teams compete in Dragon Boats, which are large canoe-like vessels fitted with ornately carved dragon heads and tails. Crews of up to 16 people sit in pairs and paddle to compete in races over distances of around 250m. Each boat has a drummer beating time to keep the paddlers in unison and a professional helms person in the stern to guide the boat.

This year, we had 52 teams and each raised funds for a nominated charity. Kingston Rotary also nominated a charity for teams to support if they wish. Six teams supported Momentum, the children's charity, this year. We ask each team to raise a least £1k but we know many raised

Recently, CARA donated to the Friends of Canbury Gardens (FoCG) to help buy much needed gardening equipment, and also bought bird, bat and owl boxes for the wildlife section of the Gardens.

KINGSTON PEREGRINES

Elliot Newton, the Biodiversity Officer for Kingston, and Helen Cavanagh, Head of Facilities at Kingston College, gave a fabulous talk about the Kingston Peregrines, in June.

Peregrines are part of the falcon family, and are the fastest animals on earth, beating the cheetah in speed. They hunt pigeons and parakeets. Peregrines and their nesting sites are protected by law.

The talk was to a full house in the Pavilion and covered topics including the history of peregrines in the UK, the peregrines' hunting ability, and then specifically on balancing the college's facilities, telecoms facilities and a protected nesting site; creating a safe space for both humans and falcons; and some lovely and entertaining stories about the peregrines, especially about the juveniles when they learn how to fly and feed themselves.

The key message from the talk is that urban wildlife and humans can harmoniously live together. A very big thank you to Helen and Elliot for holding this talk.

Elliot Newton the Biodiversity Officer for Kingston Council, tells us:-



As we approach autumn it is likely you might hear *vocalisation* commonly known as the 'too-wit too-woo' call. This is often attributed to the typical owl song, but actually this call belongs to the **tawny owl.** However, this call is not produced by an individual bird; rather, it arises from a duet between a male and a female communicating with one another.

In this exchange, the **female emits a 'too-wit'** sound, to which the **male responds with a 'too-woo'!**

This helps to strengthen the pair bond between the birds which mate for life.

Tawny owls have been seen and heard in Canbury Gardens, and CARA working with the Friends group is soon to install a Tawny Owl nesting box.

We worked with FoCG to install the bird boxes in the biodiversity area of Canbury Gardens, and hopefully they will become inhabited very soon by our feathered friends.

CANBURY GARDENS - GREEN FLAG

In July, Canbury Gardens was awarded the prestigious Green Flag Award.

The Green Flag Award scheme is an international standard recognising and rewarding well managed parks and green spaces, setting the benchmark for the management of recreational outdoor spaces across the United Kingdom and around the world.

To achieve this status, the Park's management, gardeners and Friends Group had to demonstrate tangible improvement and regeneration activities, including park layout, biodiversity considerations, litter management, signage, and local community involvement.

This status shows that Canbury Gardens has social as well as physical infrastructure, offering health and wellbeing benefits, and maintaining connections with nature.

What are some additional benefits of the Green Flag status? This status can attract biodiversity enthusiasts, bird watchers, or tourists to the park. When you hold an event in the park or if your business is in, or close to, the park, you can include a mention of the Green Flag status in your marketing materials.

We can all be very proud of this achievement, as it showcases our community's passion and commitment for protecting our green spaces. You can continue to help by joining the Friends of Canbury Gardens, watering the plants, using the tap water by Boaters, or helping with litter picks.
