

KING ATHELSTAN 925-939CE WAS THE FIRST KING OF ALL THE ANGLO SAXONS. AFTER A MAJOR BATTLE AGAINST THE ASSEMBLED NORTHERN KINGS AND THE VIKING STRONGHOLD OF NORTHUMBRIA, IN 927, HE CONSOLIDATED THE ANGLO SAXON KINGDOMS AND MADE PEACE ACROSS THE LAND.

HE ADOPTED THE TITLE:- KING OF THE ENGLISH

King Athelstan, the grandson of Alfred the Great, probably chose Kingston upon Thames for his coronation as it was a strategic location between Wessex and Mercia and was already a Royal Borough. The Coronation Stone (which can be seen today in the grounds of the Guildhall, next to the police station) is made of sarsen stone, like Stonehenge. Athelstan brought peace across the land for 14 years, before he died at the age of 45 with a suspected inherited stomach illness.

Kingston Council organised the Saxon Fayre to celebrate the 900th anniversary of the coronation with our own 'King Athelstan', who was duly crowned with all pomp and ceremony, after parading over Kingston Bridge and alongside the Thames into Canbury Gardens.

King Athelstan was followed by his subjects in full 10th Century costume, along with the Mayor, as well as the Town Cryer who read the Coronation Speech when the King was ready to take his place on the throne. The newly crowned King then paraded around Canbury Gardens to the applause of his subjects.

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SWANNING AROUND IN THE GARDENS

As you know, we are lucky to live in a locale which is one of the most idyllic in the world. One of the glorious aspects of Canbury Gardens that we should never, ever, take for granted, are the swans that live here. These magnificent birds are unique and a gift to humanity.

A few weeks ago, locals were concerned about the length of time a particular swan was sitting on her eggs. So let's look at the facts, swans usually only lay eggs once a year. The conditions have to be right for them and they instinctively know when food availability, shelter, and weather conditions meet their requirements. It needs to be a quiet part of the river, away from possible predators, sadly not always achievable with foxes on the lookout for a tasty snack. As creatures of habit, once the perfect spot is located, they tend to return there, every year. Swans lead the way in homemaking and care for offspring as they share all the labour, from building the nest, nurturing the eggs, caring for the babies and faithfully staying together for life. The male 'cob' scouts for the perfect spot and lays the groundwork with sticks, twigs and aquatic plants, and sadly, sometimes including plastic waste, then the 'pen' weaves the materials into a sturdy cradle.

The incubation period is the thing that brings concern to caring onlookers but knowing the facts helps with worrying unnecessarily, as depending on conditions it can be anytime between 33 & 46 days. So in future we just count the days and wait before getting anxious.



The length of time in the egg doesn't make any difference to the development of the fluffy grey cygnet. The cygnets, once born, stay with their parents, learning by observation and mimicking. Then like the 'Ugly Duckling', they grow into magnificent majestic birds just like Mum and Dad.

Unfortunately, the other swan and her partner, we locals were watching for so long, weren't successful with their eggs. They went over the 46 days and eventually the Swan Sanctuary took away the eggs and nest. They also, took the bereft parents into care.

AND NOW THE BAD NEWS:-

The consultation by Thames Water on the Teddington Direct River Abstraction (TDRA) scheme has ended. If it goes ahead the TDRA will do irreparable harm to the local ecology with discharges of warm, partially treated sewage into the river. This is a very poor and expensive scheme. Kingston has a diverse and vibrant population, seen outwardly as an affluent area. However, shockingly, statistics show 20% of Kingston's children, 5,733, are living in deep poverty and 77% of these are from working households.

As one aspect of their work **over the past 4 years, Kingston Giving** have awarded £107,000 in grants, benefiting 57 organisations and and over 50,000 residents.
